1B (in England) an annual holiday in (industrial) England Traduction française : **jour férié**

1C. Historically a vigil commemorating the dedication of a church Traduction française **veillée**: or a fair or merrymaking on this occasion: Traduction française : **fête**

2. The trackleft on the water's surface by a moving ship or turbulent air left behind a moving aircraft. Traduction française: **sillage**
